Regulations Governing the B.Com., LL.B - Five Years Integrated Course.

PREAMBLE

The University of Mysore, Mysore has decided to establish a separate School of Law of National repute to commemorate its fruitful legacy of 100 years, to impart quality legal education to prepare the present generation to build a society assuring equality with human dignity.

To give the students sufficient opportunity to hear traditional lecture classes and also expose them to the real societal problems through Practical Work.

To provide opportunity for them to work with eminent jurists, practical lawyers, judicial officers, civil society organizations, administrators, industries etc., through internship programmes.

To give maximum scope for research to provide them opportunity to select a special branch of study wherein they can acquire highest degree of knowledge through seminars and dissertations and also motivate them to take up academic teaching as their carrier.

To empower them to acquire knowledge in inter disciplinary courses by encouraging them to take up short time courses in any other departments or affiliated colleges or in any of the law schools.

To create an opportunity to the teachers and students to teach and study in any of the National Law Schools in India and in Foreign Universities through entering in to

Memorandum of Understanding with such Universities for teachers exchange programme and students exchange programmes.

To prepare the students suitable to the present day market driven scenario and assist them to get better placement in Industries, Legal firms, NGO's, etc., by providing placement opportunities, the following regulations are being framed:

1. TITLE

These regulations may be called as University of Mysore School of Law Regulations Governing the Five Years B.Com, LL.B Integrated Course. The course shall be run under Fully Self Financed Scheme in the University of Mysore under a separate wing called University of Mysore School of Law, co-ordinated by a Director appointed by the University.

2. COMMENCEMENT

These regulations shall come into force from the academic year 2016-17.

3. DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME

- 3.1 The duration of the B.Com, LL.B Programme shall be five academic years. Each academic year shall comprise of two semesters. Each semester shall consist of minimum 20 (Twenty) weeks.
- 3.2 A candidate who successfully completes the ten semesters shall be eligible for the award of B.Com, LL.B degree.

4. ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION

- i) A candidate seeking admission to the B.Com, LL.B Degree Course shall have passed the Pre University Course or Higher Secondary School Examination (10+2) system or an equivalent examination such as 11+1 from a recognized Board, Institution or University of India or from a foreign Institution or foreign University recognized as equivalent thereto securing in the aggregate marks not less than 45% (in case of SC/ST 40% and OBC 42%) of the total marks.
- ii) If a candidate from General Category has obtained 44.5 % or 39.5 % or 41.5% in case he belongs to the category of SC/ST it shall be rounded off to 45%. or 40% 0r 42 respectively
- iii) There shall be an entrance examination conducted at the national level for selection of candidates on the date fixed by the University. However, those who have secured highest score in the CLAT (Common Law Admission Test) Examination or any other examination conducted by any of the National Law Universities or private Universities shall also be held eligible for admission in case of insufficient number of students qualified in the University Entrance Test. However, this condition is not applicable to foreign students.
- iv) The maximum age limit for admission incase of students belongs to the General category is 20 years as on 1st June of the year of admission. In case of students belonging to SC/ST,

the maximum age limit shall be 22 years as on 1st June of the year of admission. However, the restriction on age shall not be applicable to foreign nationals.

- v) In case of foreign nationals, the candidate must have studied English language as one of the compulsory subject in 10+2 or equivalent higher Secondary School Examination by obtaining grade or marks equivalent to 45 % in aggregate as determined by the Equivalence Committee. The Admission Committee may conduct an English language competence test if required. On the basis of requisite English language standard, the candidate will be provisionally admitted.
- vi) The intake for the course shall be 60 (sixty).
- vii) Reservation of seats in admission for SC/ST and Other Backward Classes (OBC) as contemplated by the Government of Karnataka and followed by the University. In the event of non availability of the SC/ST and Other Backward Classes candidates, the students from General Category or foreign students may be admitted.
- viii) There shall be no lateral entry or exit. However, transfer from similar programme of other Universities to the 3rd, 5th, 7th and 9th semester is permissible subject to the clearance of all the papers in the previous semester examinations.

5. SCHEME OF INSTRUCTION AND TRAINING

- i) The medium of instruction shall be in English. The candidates are not allowed to write their examination in any other language. However, there shall be a Kannada paper for those who have studied Kannada as one of the subject in their SSLC/10th standard. For non Kannada students there shall be an optional subject viz. English/French/Hindi or any other subjects provided in the Legal Education Rules, 2008 of the Bar Council of India if 10 or more number of students enrolled for that subject otherwise, English shall be the only optional subject.
- ii) The hours of instruction per paper per week shall be 6 hours out of which 1 hour may be tutorial, conducted in day hours, and the total number of class hours per week including tutorials, moot court exercise and seminars shall be minimum of 30 hours.
- iii) Each registered student shall have completed minimum of 20 weeks of internship during the entire period of legal studies (in each year not more than 4 weeks during vacation) under NGOs, Advocates, Judiciary, Legal Regulatory Authorities, Legislature, other Legal Functionaries, Market Institutions, Law Firms, Companies and Local Self Government or any other Authorities or Organizations notified by the Law School.

6. ATTENDANCE:

- i) Students are required to attend a minimum of 75% of classes in every semester.
- ii) If a student has not attended 75% of the total classes held, he/she shall be declared as disqualified and shall not be allowed to appear for the examination at the end of the semester. He/ She shall re-register himself/ herself for the course when it is next offered.

- iii) Provided, If a student for any exceptional reasons fail to attend 75% of the classes held in any subject, the Director of the Law School, may allow the student to take the test if the student concerned attended at least 65% of the classes held in the subject concerned and attended 75% of classes in all the subjects taken together.
- iv) If a candidate represents the University/State/Nation in sports, NCC, NSS, Cultural activities, Moot Court Competition or participated in any programmes on Legal Aid, Lok adalat, or involves in preparation of public interest litigation, he/she shall be exempted from attendance requirement to the extent of number days of such participation, which shall not exceed 15 days per semester.

7. EXAMINATION

- i) At the end of each semester, examination shall be conducted by the University for those students, who have fulfilled the course requirements. The written examination shall be the combination of the both Descriptive and problem solving type. Internal Assessment examination/Practical examinations shall be completed at least 10 days prior to commencement of theory examination and these internal/practical marks shall be communicated to the University before commencement of theory examination.
- ii)Distribution of Marks
 - a) Maximum Marks: 100
 - b)Examination: 70
 - c) Internal Assessment: 30
- iii)Distribution of Internal Assessment
 - a) One IA test: 15
 - b) Seminar: 05
 - c) Assignment: 10
- iv) However, for Clinical courses I, II, III & IV, the whole 100 marks is divided as per the Bar Council of India rules i.e.,90 Marks for Records and exercises and 10 Marks for Viva-Voce.
- v) There shall be no retest for improvement in IA marks.
- vi) There shall be no Repeat Examination in the clinical courses (practical). However, reregistration to the concerned semester may be allowed.

8. PROMOTION, CARRYOVER SYSTEM AND COMPLETION

i) There shall be no full carryover, the promotion to subsequent years is as per the following criteria:

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
